PASTOR'S MESSAGE



For the Birds!

I have had a bird feeder in my backyard for many years. I've tried different feeders, some rather fancy, others quite plain. It seems that the best one I've had is also the cheapest – with clear plastic sides and a light green roof. The birds flock to it. It is a joy to watch them – Tufted Titmouse, Yellow Finch, Cardinals, Robins, and Blue Jays. The Blue Jays are my least polite dinner guests with their aggressive attitude. They are birdfeeder bullies. As I watch them I understand how they have earned their reputation as villains of the songbird avian world!

My enjoyment in watching the birds is not without its problems. Yes, you guessed it – squirrels! While the Blue Jays are impolite, the squirrels are downright rude. They are greedy, unwelcome guests as far as I am concerned. No matter how hard I try to outsmart them, positioning the bird feeder "just so" and even spraying WD-40 on the pole so they can't get a grip, they always seem to manage. First, they scare the birds away. Then they gorge themselves using those dastardly little front paws. If they can dump the seeds on the ground, they do.



Even though I try to scare them away, they always come back. They stand at the edge of the grass and wait until I'm not looking. The worst part of it, is that I have put the seeds out for the birds, not the squirrels. It doesn't matter. After I refill the feeder yet again, I watch the birds and squirrels vie for a seat at the table. Have you ever had unwelcome "squirrels" in your life - those who have just messed up your plans and good intentions? Those who have been inconsiderate, and uncaringly dumped your seeds and taken the best for themselves? I think we all have experienced this at one time or another. They can make us angry and hurt us by their actions, and then we are left holding onto that hurt and disappointment, for who knows how long!

Lent is a good time to reflect on how we hold onto such things. We may want our past offenders to repent and ask for forgiveness, but that doesn't always happen, does it? How then are we to move on - to be free - from the bitterness that may be consuming us?

The Apostle Paul would tell us to forgive anyway. When he was faced with hurtful opposition, he found something to rejoice in. He trusted in the power of the cross of Jesus Christ. He surrendered his hurt to the wisdom and power of the Divine. In other words, he gave it to God. And with God's help, he was able to forgive.

The gift of God's ultimate forgiveness for us through Jesus is the gem we reach for in the season of Lent. This is what it is all about. Finding a way to let go of those things which burden our hearts and keep us from life's joy is part of the good work of the season. Walking on paths towards reconciliation, wherever that leads, will lead us towards peace. So then let us begin. As for me, I will start by trying to forgive the squirrels in my life. After all, they get hungry too.





NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETING

A Special Meeting of the First Congregational Church of Scarborough, Maine will be held at 11:00 AM on Sunday, March 9, 2025 in the Church Sanctuary. The gathering is to act on the recommendation of the Covenant Development Team as affirmed by the Church Council:

WHEREAS:

The First Congregational Church of Scarborough ("FCC") has been a Schedule 2 Church of the United Church of Christ ("UCC") since the formation of the denomination in 1957; and

After a discernment process undertaken by the Transitional Steering and Covenant Development Teams with participation by the congregation, we believe that being a fully covenanted church in the UCC would be mutually beneficial to our church and to the denomination;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the congregation hereby authorizes the Covenant Development Team of the FCC:

To send a letter of request for full standing in the United Church of Christ, to the Church and Ministry Committee of the Maine Conference Cumberland Association of the United Church of Christ; and we agree to accept fully covenanted status as a church in the United Church of Christ, should it be accepted by them

Imagine Together Stewardship Campaign 2025-2026

Our stewardship theme this year is <u>Imagine Together</u>. What is imagining? To me it is about dreaming, being creative, making pictures in my head of what I want to do, considering what might be possible. It is the kicking off of changes in my life, in how I might go about making life better for my family and me. What is it for you? What does this mean for this church? What are some of your dreams for this church?

You'll hear from members of our Ministry of Stewardship over the next few weeks about their visions for the church and our community. As we talk about what we imagine, please think about your hopes and dreams for this faith community.

The Bible speaks of dreams, imaginings, in many places. God wants us to become all that we can be. That includes all those dreams stored in our heads. What vision inspires you to make a difference in our congregation, community, or even the world? Do you imagine a church that cares about the rights and dignity of everyone? That is a present for the next generation? That is strong, and active now? God sends the Holy Spirit in the form of inspiration, or vision to urge us to speak those dreams aloud, <u>and</u> to bring some of them into being. After hearing our dreams and dreaming yours, you can then decide on how you would like to pledge for the coming year so we can begin to work on some of those visions.

Pursuit of our visions, however, requires money. One of our biggest dreams is to increase support for our church through stewardship and pledging. Last year we dreamt big, and thanks to all of you, we exceeded our goal. Our goal in 2024 was \$140,000. We actually received pledges for \$160,506, a substantial increase. Our goal this year is \$170,000, which is an increase of 6% with 6 new pledges. Our donations make it possible to turn what we imagine into reality. Through our annual commitments we imagine together all that we can do.

Our Stewardship campaign will run from February 2 to March 16th. On the 16th we will collect our pledge cards bless them, and pray that with God's help we can begin to bring our dreams into reality. We ask for your enthusiastic support of our Stewardship Campaign. Following the service that day, please plan to join us as we gather for a brunch in celebration of your generosity.
